IV. Health Commissioner Report: Mr. Migliozzi presented a written report to the Board. Kent State University contacted Mr. Migliozzi regarding a shared services agreement, and they want to use the format that we used statewide. We heard from PHAB on Monday, we did not achieve accreditation, and we will now have to develop an action plan. Domain 7, which pertains to access to care, was our biggest issue that we need to address. We have 90 days to submit our action plan. We achieved high scores in Domains 11 & 12. We have to align our CHA (Community Health Assessment) with Mercy Health, which is due in 2019. Domain 7 will be addressed in the new CHA. Mercy is hiring a consulting firm to work on the CHA. Mercy will pay half of the cost, but is looking for additional funding. The estimated cost is \$110,000.00, and all the local health districts are being asked to participate. The Mahoning County Health District is contributing \$15,000.00, which is the amount received from the state for accreditation, and is requesting more from their Board, Youngstown City Health District is contributing \$4,500.00, and will be requesting an additional \$1,000.00 from their Board, Warren City Health District has made no monetary commitment at this time. Mr. Migliozzi requested that the Board authorize a financial commitment toward the consulting fee for the CHA, of \$15,000.00, which is also what our health district received from the state, and additional financial support, if needed. Mrs. Salapata asked as to how much more Mr. Migliozzi felt might be needed. Mr. Migliozzi responded that the Health Commissioner from Mahoning County was going to request an additional \$5,000.00 from their Board.



Illnesses from Mosquito, Tick, and Flea Bites Increasing in the US

Cases triple; better tools needed to fight mosquitoes, ticks, and fleas

Illnesses from mosquito, tick, and flea bites have tripled in the U.S., with more than 640,000 cases reported during the 13 years from 2004 through 2016. Nine new germs spread by mosquitoes and ticks were discovered or introduced into the United States during this time.

These findings are in the latest <u>Vital Signs</u> report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. This is CDC's first summary collectively examining data trends for all nationally notifiable diseases caused by the bite of an infected mosquito, tick, or flea. It provides detailed information on the growing burden of mosquito-borne and tickborne illnesses in the U.S.

"Zika, West Nile, Lyme, and chikungunya—a growing list of diseases caused by the bite of an infected mosquito, tick, or flea—have confronted the U.S. in recent years, making a lot of people sick. And we don't know what will threaten Americans next," said CDC Director Robert R. Redfield, M.D. "Our Nation's first lines of defense are state and local health departments and vector control organizations, and we must continue to enhance our investment in their ability to fight against these diseases."

U.S. not fully prepared

Widespread and difficult to control, diseases from mosquito, tick, and flea bites are major causes of sickness and death worldwide. The growing number and spread of these diseases pose an increasing risk in the U.S. The report found that the nation needs to be better prepared to face this public health threat.

CDC scientists analyzed data reported to the National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System for 16 notifiable vector-borne diseases from 2004 through 2016 to identify trends. Many infections are not reported or recognized, so it is difficult to truly estimate the overall cost and burden of these diseases. In 2016, the most common tickborne diseases in the U.S. were Lyme disease and ehrlichiosis/anaplasmosis. The most common mosquito-borne viruses were West Nile, dengue, and Zika. Though rare, plague was the most common disease resulting from the bite of an infected flea.

The increase in diseases caused by the bite of an infected mosquito, tick, or flea in the U.S. is likely due to many factors. Mosquitoes and ticks and the germs they spread are increasing in number and moving into new areas. As a result, more people are at risk for infection. Overseas travel and commerce are more common than



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ever before. A traveler can be infected with a mosquito-borne disease, like Zika, in one country, and then unknowingly transport it home. Finally, new germs spread by mosquito and tick bites have been discovered and the list of nationally notifiable diseases has grown.

Key findings

- A total of 642,602 cases of disease caused by the bite of an infected mosquito, tick, or flea were reported in the U.S. and its territories from 2004 through 2016.
- The number of reported tickborne diseases more than doubled in 13 years and accounted for more than 60 percent of all reported mosquito-borne, tickborne, and fleaborne disease cases. Diseases from ticks vary from region to region across the U.S. and those regions are expanding.
- From 2004 through 2016, seven new germs spread through the bite of an infected tick were discovered or recognized in the U.S. as being able to infect people.
- Reducing the spread of these diseases and responding to outbreaks effectively will require additional
 capacity at the state and local level for tracking, diagnosing, and reporting cases; controlling mosquitoes
 and ticks; and preventing new infections; and for the public and private sector to develop new diagnostic
 and vector control tools.

"The data show that we're seeing a steady increase and spread of tickborne diseases, and an accelerating trend of mosquito-borne diseases introduced from other parts of the world," said Lyle Petersen, M.D., M.P.H., director of the Division of Vector-Borne Diseases in the CDC's National Center for Emerging and Zoonotic Infectious Diseases. "We need to support state and local health agencies responsible for detecting and responding to these diseases and controlling the mosquitoes, ticks, and fleas that spread them."

How can state and local public health agencies help?

- Build and sustain public health programs that test for and track diseases and the mosquitoes and ticks that spread them.
- Train vector control staff on five core competencies for conducting prevention and control activities. [http://bit.ly/2FG1OMw]
- Educate the public about how to prevent bites and control germs spread by mosquitoes, ticks, and fleas
 in their communities.

What can everyone do to protect themselves from mosquito, tick, and flea bites?

- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Treat items, such as boots, pants, socks, and tents, with permethrin or use permethrin-treated clothing and gear.
- Take steps to control ticks and fleas on pets.



Purpose/Policy Statement:

To establish a system by which <u>TCCHD</u> employees follow the Public Health Code of Ethics and to protect TCCHD and the Board of Health's interest when contemplating entering into a transaction or arrangement that might benefit the private interest of a member of TCCHD's management staff and/or Board of Health.

Definitions/Acronyms:

<u>Interested Person</u>: Any member of TCCHD's management or Board of Health and any of their immediate family members who has direct or indirect financial interest, as defined below.

<u>Financial Interest</u>: A person has a financial interest if the person has, directly or indirectly, through business, investment or family:

- Ownership or investment in any entity with which TCCHD has a transaction or arrangement.
- A potential ownership or investment interest in, or personal compensation arrangement with, any entity or individual with which TCCHD is negotiating a transaction or arrangement.

Compensation: Includes direct and indirect remuneration as well as gifts or favors that are not insubstantial.

TCCHD: Trumbull County Combined Health District

ORC: Ohio Revised Code

Procedure:

1.0 Ethical Practice of Public Health

- 1.1 All TCCHD employees are expected to maintain the highest possible ethical and moral standards and to perform within the laws of the State of Ohio (Section 102 of the Ohio Revised Code) and other rules and regulations as may be set forth by the Board of Health.
- 1.2 Additionally, the Trumbull County Board of Health has chosen to adopt the Public Health Code of Ethics. All TCCHD work, decisions, actions, etc. will be done within the confines of the Public Health Code of Ethics as listed in the Principles of the Ethical Practice of Public Health, Attachment A.

2.0 Conflicts of Interest

- 2.1 <u>Duty to Disclose</u>. In connection with any actual or possible conflict of interest, an interested person must immediately disclose the existence of the financial interest and be given the opportunity to disclose all material facts to the Trumbull County Combined Health District Health Commissioner and Board of Health members involved in the proposed transaction or arrangement.
- 2.2 <u>Determining if Conflict of Interest Exists</u>. After disclosure of the financial interest and all other material facts and after discussion, the member shall leave the meeting while the determination of a conflict of interest is discussed and voted upon by the remaining members.

2.3 Procedures for Addressing the Possible Conflict of Interest.

- 2.3.1 The Board shall determine whether it can obtain with reasonable efforts a more advantageous transaction or arrangement from a person or entity that would not give rise to a conflict of interest.
- 2.3.2 If a more advantageous transaction or arrangement is not reasonably possible under the circumstances not producing a conflict of interest, the Board shall determine by a majority vote the disinterested members whether the transaction arrangement is in the Board of Health's best interest, for its own benefit and whether it is fair and reasonable.

2.4 Violation of the Conflict of Interest Policy

- 2.4.1 If the Board has reasonable cause to believe a member of the Board or TCCHD Management has failed to disclose actual or possible conflicts of interest, it shall inform the member of the basis for this belief and afford the member an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.
- 2.4.2 If after hearing the member's response and after making further investigation as warranted by the circumstances, the governing board or committee determines the member has failed to disclose an actual or possible conflict of interest, it shall take corrective action.

2.5 Records of Proceeding

- 2.5.1 The names of the person(s) who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a financial interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the financial interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest existed and the Board's decision as to whether a conflict of interest in fact existed.
- 2.5.2 The names of the persons who were present for discussion including any alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

2.6 Compensation

A member of TCCHD Management or member of the Board who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the organization for services is precluded from making decisions and/or voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.

2.7 Annual Statements

2.7.1 Has received a copy of the conflict of interest policy;

- 2.7.2 Has read and understands the policy;
- 2.7.3 Has agreed to comply with the policy; and
- 2.7.4 Has completed the Conflict of Interest Questionnaire, Attachment B.

Board of Health Report May 23, 2018 for April 2018

- The Nursing Division received notice of award for the 2019 PHEP (Public Health Emergency Preparedness) grant in the amount of \$141,153.00. This is a 7.02% reduction from the amount allocated in the RFP which was \$151,809.00
- The Nursing Division received a notice of award for the 2019 MQT (Mom's Quit for Two) grant in the amount of \$49,718.80. This is \$9,643.80 more than received in 2018.
- The MCH (Maternal Child Health), CFK (Cribs for Kids) and MIECHV (Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting) grants have been posted on time. This completes 2019 grant submission for the Nursing Division.
- The home visiting program coordinator and two home visitors attended the first home visiting summit in Columbus on April 16, 2018. Tara Lucente received the Home Visitor of the year award for our region.
- Rita Spahlinger, R.N. facilitated the POD (Point of Dispensing) drill at KSU on April 24, 2018. Twenty four KSU Nursing students and volunteers from Warren City Health District, TC Mental Health Recovery Board participated at this event. Prior to the drill, Randee Shoenberger, Epidemiologist, provided a presentation on the agent, Anthrax; and Kathy Parrilla R.N. provided a presentation on the Incident Command System.
- The Nursing Director and three Public Health Nurses attended the Warren Youngstown Airport Drill on April 27, 2018. This was a full scale exercise that involved a crashed airplane and was featured on the local news stations. TCCHD provided the triage cards and assisted with volunteers for this exercise.
- Kathy Parrilla, R.N. attended the fourth annual drug summit on April 27, 2018. Kathy is part of the planning team for this summit and was a facilitator at this event. She provided Project DAWN training and distributed 52 kits at this summit.

Figure 1. A monthly count of emergency departments visits due to overdoses in Trumbull County by Zip Codes. There were <u>46</u> overdoses during the month of April.




Figure 2. Gender distribution of overdose-related ED visits; Trumbull County; April 2018





Figure 3. Age distribution of overdose-related ED visits; Trumbull County, April 2018

Figure 4. Days of the week that the overdoses are occurring.






Figure 5. Chart of overdoses from December 2017 to April 2018



According to Harvard School of Public Health, a recent Scottish study that found bike commuters had a lower risk of cardiovascular disease (CVD), cancer, or death from any cause during the five-year study period compared to those who took a car or public transportation to work. Other benefits include:

- Bike riding uses minimal fossil fuels and is a pollutionfree mode of transport.
- Cycling 10 km each way to work each day will save about A\$1700 per year in transport costs (including all running costs and depreciation).
- Cycling provides economic and independent travel for those who might otherwise have their travel options restricted.
- More people cycling and walking provides additional opportunity for social interaction on the streets and this enhances a sense of community.

SCOPE, recently formed the S.O.S. Team, who will visit our seniors to support and protect if needed.




SCOPE has also been able to do check-ups for health issues and to get seniors in contact with agency, medical, and business partners to help.




