Health Commissioners were informed, at the annual Association of Ohio Health Commissioners Conference, that the Ohio State University would be conducting two assessments on behalf of ODH with local health departments regarding accreditation. The one assessment would be a financial assessment to see whether the health district is financially capable of becoming accredited, and the other is to determine accreditation readiness, and where the district is at in the accreditation process. These assessments will be completed by November. Any health departments that are required to submit action plans, will be required to have them submitted between January and March, and those health districts will be reassessed in January 2018, and the Director of Health will recommend mergers of health districts where needed, with a deadline for accreditation by 2020.

The state holds monthly health affair meetings in Columbus, and Mr. Migliozzi requested permission to attend those monthly meetings.

If a structure is structural unsafe, that is no longer under the auspices of the health department, but will fall under the building department or fire department. A health district can declare a structure unfit and a public health nuisance for lack of plumbing, sewage, water or gross unsanitary conditions, but the structure must be occupied. Atty. Kokor suggested sending something to all the township trustees notifying them of the changes in ORC 505.86 regarding the removal, repair or securance of unsecured, unsafe buildings or structures, and ORC 3707.01 Powers of board – abatement of nuisances.

Mr. Hedge, the inspector who conducted the assessment, stated that he was unable to access the inside, and his recommendation was primarily based upon the outside structural issues, and that he had nothing new to add. There had been some solid waste issues approximately 2-3 years ago, which became before the Board and charges were filed regarding those issues. Atty. Kokor stated that if there was nothing new to add since the last meeting, there was no reason for the Board to change the action taken at the last meeting.

Health Commissioner's Report -September 2016 Board of Health Meeting

1) Budget

- The general fund continues to show that expenditures are exceeding revenues; however, this is approximately where the general fund was at this same time last year. In September 2015, we collected approximately \$146,000.00 in taxes, and we estimate that we will receive slightly more this September due to the fact that we will be receiving inside millage from Niles also. In addition, the grants that are showing large balances, are monies that are due to be reimbursed to the general fund.
- The sewage treatment system fund, 974, still shows a negative balance; however, we are continuing to not make any expenditures out of that fund, but monies will continue to be deposited so that fund should be back in the black by year's end.
- 2) Every property owner who was due a "simple" refund (properties that did not change ownership) has been refunded. There were 159 "simple" refunds processed, for a total of \$18,146.25. The remaining refunds due are for properties that transferred ownership. A list of these properties was compiled and given to the treasurer's office. The treasurer's office reviewed the list to determine if the taxes were paid and by whom. This list will now be reviewed by our office to start the process of refunding the proper owners.
- The bulk of my time from 8/13/16 9/16/16 was spent on administrative work and accreditation.
- 4) As you are aware, the 10 year consent agreement between the EPA and the board of health, which dealt with additional regulations for sewage treatment system installations in Trumbull County, was lifted effective September 2, 2016. The 3 major points of concern for our agency is as follows:
 - a) The board of health can grant a variance from sewer tie in, provided that the property has a functioning septic system that is not creating a public health nuisance, as defined by ORC 3718.011. Discharging systems cannot apply for variance.
 - b) Virgin lots platted before January 1, 2007, per OAC 3701-29-06 (F) can now be considered for coverage under the EPA general permit pertaining to NPDES systems.
 - c) Installers can install any system that is approved by ODH and on the ODH approved list. i.e. No pump station and sand filters are required.
 - d) The health district no longer must submit an annual report to the EPA regarding our O&M program.


Representatives Sean O'Brien & Michael O'Brien held a press conference on September 14, 2016, with myself, Kris Wilster, Mr. Biery, Mr. Simon, Mr. Dubos, representatives from the Ohio EPA and the County Commissioners in attendance, announcing the lifting of the consent agreement. The lifting of this consent agreement does not relieve Trumbull County from applying the current ODH regulations, or be accountable to ODH for proper application of the sewage regulations. If anyone has any questions regarding the lifting of the consent agreement, please contact myself or Kris Wilster.

We have been informed by the Ohio EPA that it is close to a settlement with Lafarge, and final findings & orders will be issued soon. At that point the EPA will deem Lafarge in substantial compliance and the board of health will be asked to consider a vote on their application. As such, I will be requesting that the board hold a special meeting to act upon the 2016 license. The reasoning behind holding a special meeting is to have representatives of the EPA to be present to discuss the terms of their findings & orders, how it will impact Lafarge, what will be required of the board of health and the obligations of the environmental division in carrying out the findings & orders. I requested that Mr. Dubos consult with Mayor Arno Hill about hosting this special meeting in Lordstown to afford the public a chance to be in attendance at the meeting to be informed of the EPA's findings.

The maximum for the youth part is \$80,000.00 and the maximum for the smoke free environment is \$30,000.00. TCCHD applied for the total maximum of \$110,000.00.
- Effective 09/16/2016: an updated Know Your ABCs Guide to Reportable Diseases in Ohio from the Ohio Administrative Code Chapter 3701-3. The major changes are the removal of MOTT (Mycobacterial other than TB) and Typhus Fever; and the addition of Zika virus as a Class B disease listed under Arborviral neuroinvasive and non-neuroinvasive disease. This updated list is the diseases that are to be reported and investigated by the TCCHD.
- Our DAWN Program has distributed 129 Naloxone kits for 2016. There have been 11 successful reversals (6 in 2015 and 5 in 2016) since the start of this program. Liberty police began carrying Naloxone on 08/17/2016.



505.86 [Effective 9/28/2016] Removal, repair or securance of insecure, unsafe buildings or structures.

(A) As used in this section:

"Party in interest" means an owner of record of the real property on which the building or structure is located, and includes a holder of a legal or equitable lien of record on the real property or the building or other structure.

"Total cost" means any costs incurred due to the use of employees, materials, or equipment of the township, any costs arising out of contracts for labor, materials, or equipment, and costs of service of notice or publication required under this section.

(B) A board of township trustees, by resolution, may provide for the removal, repair, or securance of buildings or other structures in the township that have been declared insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective by any fire department under contract with the township or by the county building department or other authority responsible under Chapter 3781. of the Revised Code for the enforcement of building regulations or the performance of building inspections in the township, or buildings or other structures that have been declared to be in a condition dangerous to life or health, or unfit for human habitation by the board of health of the general health district of which the township is a part.

At least thirty days before the removal, repair, or securance of any insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective building or other structure, the board of township trustees shall give notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to each party in interest of its intention with respect to the removal, repair, or securance of an insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective or unfit building or other structure.

If the address of a party in interest is unknown and cannot reasonably be obtained, it is sufficient to publish the notice once in a newspaper of general circulation in the township.

(C)

- (1) If the board of trustees, in a resolution adopted under this section, pursues action to remove any insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective building or other structure, the notice shall include a statement informing the parties in interest that each party in interest is entitled to a hearing if the party in interest requests a hearing in writing within twenty days after the notice was mailed. The written request for a hearing shall be made to the township fiscal officer.
- (2) If a party in interest timely requests a hearing, the board shall set the date, time, and place for the hearing and notify the party in interest by certified mail, return receipt requested. The date set for the hearing shall be within fifteen days, but not earlier than seven days, after the party in interest has requested a hearing, unless otherwise agreed to by both the board and the party in interest. The hearing shall be recorded by stenographic or electronic means.
- (3) The board shall make an order deciding the matter not later than thirty days after a hearing, or not later than thirty days after mailing notice to the parties in interest if no party in interest requested a hearing. The order may dismiss the matter or direct the removal, repair, or securance of the building or other structure. At any time, a party in interest may consent to an order.
- (4) A party in interest who requested and participated in a hearing, and who is adversely affected by the order of the board, may appeal the order under section <u>2506.01</u> of the Revised Code.
- (D) At any time, a party in interest may enter into an agreement with the board of township trustees to perform the removal, repair, or securance of the insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective or unfit building or other structure.

- (E) If an emergency \(\ell_{\cup} \), as determined by the board, notice may be given other an by certified mail and less than thirty days before the removal, repair, or securance.
- (F) The total cost of removing, repairing, or securing buildings or other structures that have been declared insecure, unsafe, structurally defective, or unfit for human habitation, or of making emergency corrections of hazardous conditions, when approved by the board, shall be paid out of the township general fund from moneys not otherwise appropriated, except that, if the costs incurred exceed five hundred dollars, the board may borrow moneys from a financial institution to pay for the costs in whole or in part.

The total cost may be collected by either of the following methods:

- (1) The board may have the fiscal officer of the township certify the total costs, together with a proper description of the lands to the county auditor who shall place the costs upon the tax duplicate. The costs are a lien upon the lands from and after the date of entry.
- (2) The board may commence a civil action to recover the total costs from the owner of record of the real property on which the building or structure is located.
- (G) Any board of township trustees may, whenever a policy or policies of insurance are in force providing coverage against the peril of fire on a building or structure and the loss agreed to between the named insured or insureds and the company or companies is more than five thousand dollars and equals or exceeds sixty per cent of the aggregate limits of liability on all fire policies covering the building or structure on the property, accept security payments and follow the procedures of divisions (C) and (D) of section 3929.86 of the Revised Code.

3707.01 Powers of board - abatement of nuisances.

The board of health of a city or general health district shall abate and remove all nuisances within its jurisdiction. It may, by order, compel the owners, agents, assignees, occupants, or tenants of any lot, property, building, or structure to abate and remove any nuisance therein, and prosecute such persons for neglect or refusal to obey such orders. Except in cities having a building department, or otherwise exercising the power to regulate the erection of buildings, the board may regulate the location, construction, and repair of water closets, privies, cesspools, sinks, plumbing, and drains. In cities having such departments or exercising such power, the legislative authority, by ordinance, shall prescribe such rules and regulations as are approved by the board and shall provide for their enforcement.

The board may regulate the location, construction, and repair of yards, pens, and stables, and the use, emptying, and cleaning of such yards, pens, and stables and of water closets, privies, cesspools, sinks, plumbing, drains, or other places where offensive or dangerous substances or liquids are or may accumulate.

When a building, erection, excavation, premises, business, pursuit, matter, or thing, or the sewerage, drainage, plumbing, or ventilation thereof is, in the opinion of the board, in a condition dangerous to life or health, and when a building or structure is occupied or rented for living or business purposes and sanitary plumbing and sewerage are feasible and necessary, but neglected or refused, the board may declare it a public nuisance and order it to be removed, abated, suspended, altered, or otherwise improved or purified by the owner, agent, or other person having control thereof or responsible for such condition, and may prosecute him for the refusal or neglect to obey such order. The board may, by its officers and employees, remove, abate, suspend, alter, or otherwise improve or purify such nuisance and certify the costs and expense thereof to the county auditor, to be assessed against the property and thereby made a lien upon it and collected as other taxes.



Healthy Babies. Born on Time.

The Trumbull County Combined Health District offers the Baby & Me Tobacco Free Program. The program was created to reduce the burden of tobacco use on the pregnant and postpartum population. It uses a unique approach, combining cessation support specific to pregnant women. Those enrolled can be pregnant women who currently smoke, or were a daily smoker at least 3 months prior to becoming pregnant. There are no age or income eligibility requirements for enrolling in this program. During the prenatal period, each enrolled participant receives four cessation counseling sessions, quit support education, and carbon monoxide testing. After the birth of the baby, the mother returns monthly to continue carbon monoxide monitoring. Each month she remains smoke-free she receives a \$25 voucher for diapers at Walmart, for up to 12 months. Women can be enrolled by calling the Trumbull County Combined Health District at 330-675-2590, option #3, or referrals from area agencies and physicians.




August Bike Rodeo

Board Accreditation Report - 9/28/16

1. <u>Accreditation Status</u>. PHAB approved our accreditation application on 9/8/16. Our new application submittal deadline is 9/8/17. Even though our deadline has been extended, our intention is to have everything submitted by 2/1/17. This will give us the necessary time to continue to switch out documents that have expired based on the PHAB timeline and get all documents scanned and submitted.

I attended the OEHA conference on 9/13/16 where I learned more about conducting Health Impact Assessments and participating in community outreach. I will be attending an Accreditation Learning Community meeting on 9/22/16 where the focus will be on the new ODH/OSU health department accreditation survey requirements, organizing PHAB documents and ODH database updates. (9% Time).

- 2. <u>Community Health Improvement Plan</u>. All CHIP priority workgroups have met. We had great participation that will help to make this process successful. Work/Action Plans have been prepared for all four groups. All intend to implement test run of plans starting October 1, 2016. The test run will allow us to tweak any objectives, actions and/or metrics before the official launch January 2017. (27% Time).
- 3. Quality Improvement. I applied for a quality improvement grant through the Ohio Development Services Agency. The grant will be used to streamline and improve the household sewage treatment process covering real estate inspections through issuing a permit-to-operate using Lean principles. If the grant is awarded to us, we will host a 5-day Kaizen Event facilitated by a QI Facilitator from Strategic Solutions. The grant will also cover Microsoft Suite (Word, Excel, Access, Outlook) training for all involved. Grant awards will be announced 11/17/16. (22% Time)
- 4. <u>Document Selection</u>. Continued working with intern to verify PHAB document selection, proper editing, dating, etc. Worked with staff members to develop and revise procedures. (42% of Time)
