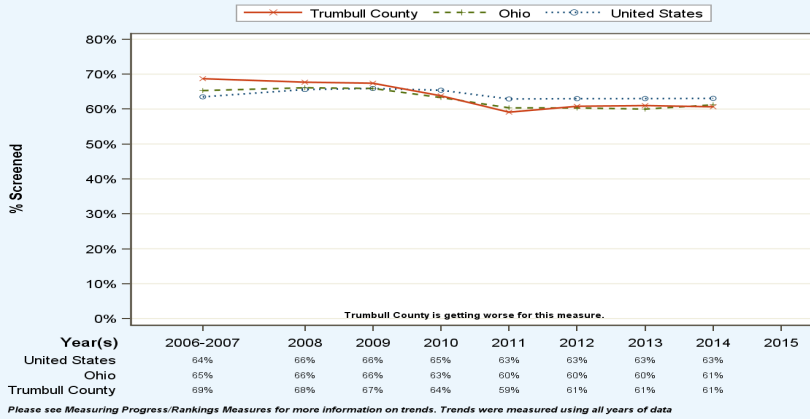

MIX

Mix medicines (do not crush tablets or capsules) with an unpalatable substance such as dirt, kitty litter, or used coffee grounds;



PLACE

Place the mixture in a container such as a sealed plastic bag;



THROW

Throw the container in your household trash;



SCRATCH OUT

Scratch out all personal information on the prescription label of your empty pill bottle or empty medicine packaging to make it unreadable, then dispose of the container.





World Of Wildlife Bicycle Tour 2018

Saturday, June 9, 2018 • Western Reserve Greenway

The 14th annual World Of Wildlife Bicycle Tour features the Western Reserve Greenway in Northeast Ohio's Trumbull and Ashtabula counties. Choose to bike 20, 40 or 68 miles or any distance you like. With the opening of the bridge north of the Oakfield Trailhead rest stop, riders will not have to detour on public roads. The out-and-back ride will occur rain or shine. Don't miss this event, the last WOW Ride sponsored by the WOW Planning Committee!

The Western Reserve Greenway passes through large sections of premier wetlands, home to much wildlife and many species of rare and endangered plant life. You might even catch a glimpse of this year's mascot, the trumpeter swan. Riders will also pass through the Mosquito Lake Wildlife Area.

WOW 2018 is a supported ride, with two refreshment stops on or near the Greenway and pizza and other refreshments at the conclusion of the ride. Greenway Bike Patrol members and other volunteers will provide on-the-trail assistance. Rest stop locations will be posted at registration.



The WOW Planning Committee is sponsoring a raffle of items donated by Bike Nashbar and other area merchants. Tickets can be purchased with the registration form and will be sold the day of the ride in the check-in/registration area. Winners will pick up their prizes upon returning from the ride.

CALL FOR COOKIES – Those who donate homemade cookies for refreshment stops will receive a complimentary raffle ticket – one for each dozen. Please bring cookies to the registration area.

ONLINE REGISTRATION is available through Eventbrite. Use the link on the WOW 2018 webpage: <http://trumbullmetroparks.org/parks-and-trails/wow-bicycle-ride>. The registrant is responsible for any additional fees. Mail-in registration remains an option.

Proceeds of WOW 2018 benefit the Trumbull County portion of the Western Reserve Greenway. Past rides have funded the pavilion materials at the Oakfield Trailhead, 2012 trail sealing and other projects. More than \$87,000 has been raised since the first WOW Ride. Any proceeds from 2018 will be donated to Trumbull County MetroParks toward the local match needed to fund Phase 4 of the Greenway, the link between Warren and Niles.

The registration deadline for WOW 2018 is May 22, 2018. The cost is \$20 per rider, if the registration form is postmarked by May 22, 2018. The cost is \$25 per rider including a commemorative T-shirt, if the registration form is postmarked by the deadline. For registrations received after the deadline and on the day of the ride, the cost is \$25 per rider, **without T-shirt**. Children under ten years of age accompanied by a registered parent/guardian may ride WOW 2018 at no charge. Limited quantities and sizes of the WOW 2018 T-shirt will be available for \$12 each at the registration area; some shirts from previous rides may also be available.

HELMETS REQUIRED – Each WOW 2018 participant is required to wear a CPSC approved bicycle helmet while on the route.

Kitchen Food Safety Toolkit

FOOD THERMOMETER



Check internal temperatures to ensure that food is safe to eat.

KITCHEN TOWELS



Don't spread bacteria - wash towels frequently.

SLOW COOKER & INSULATED CONTAINERS



Keep hot foods hot (140°F or higher) so bacteria don't grow.

KNIVES & CUTTING BOARDS



Keep raw meat and poultry separate from produce to prevent cross-contamination.

COOLER & GEL PACKS



Keep raw meat and poultry cold (40°F or below).

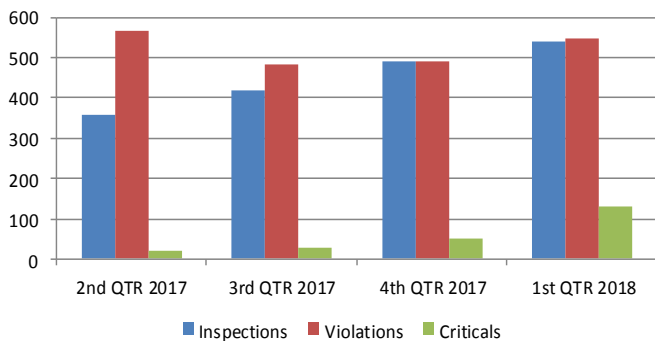
SEALED CONTAINERS

Food Inspection Trends



Food Service

The Trumbull County Combined Health District (TCCHD) has authority to license and inspect food operations within Trumbull County with the exception of those in Warren City. The purpose of these inspections is to ensure a safe dining experience for our residents. The licensing period runs from March 1 through February 28. To date, we have licensed 793 food operations for the current licensing period.

During the 1st quarter (January—March) our inspectors completed 538 inspections. The inspectors found 548 violations with 132 being critical. All the critical violations were addressed before the inspection was complete. Our inspection reports are public record and can be viewed upon request.

Household Sewage Treatment System Installation Assistance

Since 2010, the Trumbull County Commissioners working with the Trumbull County Combined Health District, the Trumbull County Sanitary Engineer's Office and the Trumbull County Building Department, have assisted 105 income-eligible, owner-occupied households with the repair or replacement (including four (4) sanitary lateral connections) of Household Sewage Treatment Systems (HSTS) through the Ohio EPA's Water Pollution Control Loan Principal Forgiveness Program. To date, \$1,418,290.78 in grant funds have been matched with \$202,961.73 in local funds to replace 105 HSTS' for a total expenditure of \$1,621,252.51.

The program's success is attributed to the professional, dedicated staff working for the Trumbull County Combined Health District, the Trumbull County Sanitary Engineer's Office and the Trumbull County Building Department who contribute to the implementation of the program in coordination with the Grants Manager. Their role is key in preparing the technical specifications, arranging for tasks to be completed ahead of the procurement process, providing inspection oversight and any critical information required to carry out the program.

Trumbull County is in the process of income-qualifying additional households for assistance in 2018 with funding available through a \$200,000 grant recently approved by the Ohio EPA. Applicants are prioritized according to a Memorandum of Understanding executed by and between the Trumbull County Commissioners and the Trumbull County Combined Health District. Trumbull County will continue to apply for these funds as long as they are offered through the Ohio EPA. The program was discontinued after Program Year 2013 and funded again in 2016 after local governments requested it be reinstated.

Other funds secured to assist households with replacing failing HSTS' includes the Ohio EPA Water Pollution Control Loan Fund; American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and the USEPA Special Appropriation Program (State and Tribal Governments); both of these programs are no longer available.

Are You Prepared?

Make a Kit

You may need to survive on your own after an emergency. This means having your own food, water, and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for at least three days. Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, but they cannot reach everyone immediately. You could get help in hours, or it might take days. In addition, basic services such as electricity, gas, water, sewage treatment, and telephones may be cut off for days.

Make a Plan

Before an emergency happens, sit down together as a family and decide how you will get in contact with each other, where you will go and what you will do in an emergency. Keep a copy of this plan in your emergency supply kit or another safe place where you can access it in the event of a disaster.

Our Household Kit

This checklist shows items that belong in an emergency supplies kit for everyone in your home. Ask a grownup to go on a scavenger hunt with you to find some items you may have already. Check off each item that you find. Work together to pack up an emergency supplies kit for your home.

Food & Water



- Three-day supply of water, one gallon per person per day
- Three-day supply of canned and dried food
- Can opener
- Cooking and eating utensils

Emergency Gear

- First aid kit
- Portable radio and extra batteries
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Cell phone charger
- Matches in waterproof container
- Cash and coins (in case credit card readers and ATMs aren't working)
- Map of your area

Personal Items



- Copies of important documents (birth certificates, passports, insurance policies, etc.)
- Blankets
- Extra clothing
- Hygiene supplies (toilet paper, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, etc.)
- Medical supplies (prescription medications, medication list, extra glasses, contact lenses, etc.)
- Baby supplies (formula, diapers, etc.), if needed
- Pet supplies, if needed

Keep your supplies organized in airtight plastic bags, and pack them in a large sturdy box or plastic tub. Store your emergency supplies kit where you can get to it quickly, in a place known to everyone in your home.

For Your Car



- Keep a separate emergency supplies kit in your car in case an emergency happens while you are on the road.
- Flashlight and extra batteries
 - First aid kit
 - White distress flag
 - Maps
 - Car cell phone charger
 - Bottled water and dried food such as granola bars
 - Breakdown supplies (tire repair kit, pump, booster/jumper cables, flares)
 - Seasonal supplies: Winter – shovel, scraper, blanket, etc.; Summer – sunscreen, shade items, etc.

Check your emergency supplies kit every six months. You may need to update some items – fresh water, fresh batteries, right-size clothes, etc. Use this planner to set dates for checking your kit.

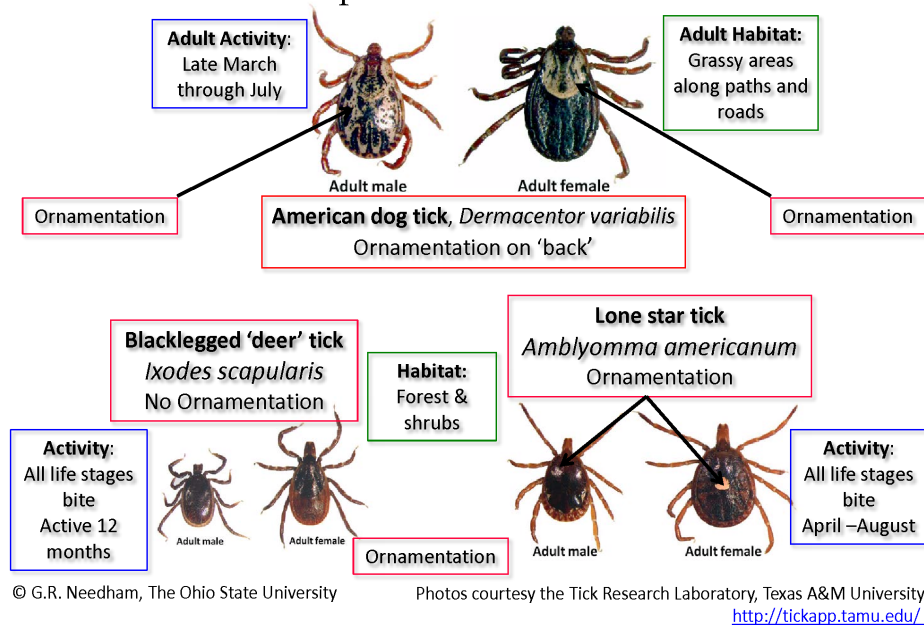

Tick Season—Know the Ohio Ticks

Three Ticks of Public Health Importance

Spot Identification



Proper Tick Removal



Blacklegged Tick or Deer Tick

The blacklegged tick is the only vector of Lyme disease in the eastern and Midwestern United States. It is also the principal vector of human granulocytic anaplasmosis and babesiosis. This tick species may be co-infected with several disease agents, and some ticks may simultaneously infect a host with two or more of these diseases.

- **Lyme Disease:** Symptoms may include a bull's-eye rash developing at the site of a tick bite within two to 32 days. This rash is diagnostic for Lyme disease. However, up to 40 percent of infected humans do not develop a ring-rash, which is almost always more than 2 to 3 inches across. Fever, headache, fatigue, or joint pain also may be symptoms of Lyme disease. Immediate antibiotic therapy for Lyme disease reduces the risk of neurological, arthritic, or cardiac complications developing days to years later.
- **Human Granulocytic Anaplasmosis:** Onset of symptoms may begin up to three weeks after a blacklegged tick bite. Initial symptoms may include fever, headache, and muscle aches. Other symptoms may include nausea, joint pain, chills, confusion, and sometimes a rash. Anaplasmosis may cause severe illness, especially if left untreated, and 50 percent of all infected individuals require hospitalization.

American Dog Tick

The American dog tick is the primary transmitter of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever (RMSF). This species may also transmit tularemia. Toxins in the tick's injected saliva have been known to cause tick paralysis in dogs and humans. Immediate tick removal usually results in a quick recovery.

- **Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever:** Onset of symptoms may begin up to three weeks after a blacklegged tick bite. Initial symptoms may include fever, headache, and muscle aches. Other symptoms may include nausea, joint pain, chills, confusion, and sometimes a rash. Anaplasmosis may cause severe illness, especially if left untreated, and 50 percent of all infected individuals require hospitalization.

Lone Star Tick



Lone star ticks are the primary transmitter of human monocytic ehrlichiosis and southern tick-associated rash illness (STARI). They also may transmit tularemia and Q-fever.

- **Human Monocytic Ehrlichiosis:** The symptoms of ehrlichiosis are the same as for anaplasmosis (see above).

Mosquito Season

Once again, the Trumbull County Combined Health District (TCCHD) will be conducting county mosquito surveillance and larviciding during the peak mosquito activity months of May through September. Surveillance includes the trapping and testing of mosquitos in various areas across the county. The early detection of mosquitos carrying West Nile Virus, Chikungunya, Zika, etc. will benefit all residents.

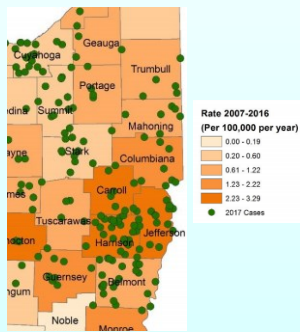

Keep mosquitoes outside

- Use air conditioning.
- Repair holes in screens.
- Keep screens on all windows.
- Keep doors and windows shut.

Stop mosquitoes from breeding

Mosquitoes breed by laying eggs in & near standing water.

As little as one teaspoon or bottle cap of water standing for more than one week is enough for mosquitoes to breed and multiply.

At your house or business:
Put away items that are outside and not being used because they could hold standing water.

In your garden:
Keep flower pots and saucers free of standing water. Some plants, such as bromeliads, hold water in their leaves—flush out water-holding plants with your hose once a week.

Around all buildings:
At least once a week, empty, turn over or cover anything that could hold water:

- tires
- buckets
- toys
- pools & pool covers
- birdbaths
- trash, trash containers and recycling bins
- boat or car covers
- roof gutters
- coolers
- pet dishes

Fight the Bite!

Protect yourself against tick and mosquito bites. These bugs may carry diseases that can make you sick.

DON'T

Do this stuff

- Don't breathe repellents
- Don't spray your face
- Don't spray repellents on cuts, burrs, or rashes
- Don't put repellents on little kid's hands.

DO

Do this stuff

- Use repellents containing DEET and always follow label directions.
- Spray repellents when outdoors
- Wear light colored clothes
- Wear long-sleeve shirts and long pants
- Stay indoors during dawn and dusk
- Wash off repellents when you go indoors.
