A new Vaccine for Covid-19 is right around the corner.

On Monday 9-11-2023, the FDA (Food and Drug Administration) approved updated Covid vaccines from both Pfizer and Moderna. These vaccines are meant to combat the omnicron variant XBB 1.5. Those age 12 and older are approved and will be able get the vaccine, while children ages 6 to 11 are only authorized under emergency use.

These vaccines have been approved by the CDC (Centers for Disease Control, and will be accessible at various vaccine sites, however, distribution to these vaccine sites will require time considering this is the first vaccine rollout since the end of the US Covid-19 public health emergency which occurred in May of 2023. These vaccines should be available to the general public by the middle of September. For your status on getting a shot call the nursing division at 330-675-2489, or a local pharmacy.

The TCCHD continues to monitor this vaccine rollout, while also working with state and federal officials to insure the vaccine will be available for Trumbull County Residents.

Covid-19 Data:

As of 9-13-2023:

• Trumbull County has 97 cases per 100,000, with a case count of 192.

<u>A message from the TCCHD Nursing Director and Immunization</u> Coordinator regarding RSV.

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial virus) can cause acute lower respiratory infections such as pneumonia and bronchitis. It spreads by direct contact, either by droplets or touching surfaces that have been contaminated by RSV. Infants 24 months and younger and adults 60 years and older are most affected by the virus. Currently there is not a vaccine for infants but a monoclonal antibody has recently been approved by the FDA, which can be administered via IM. There is an adult RSV vaccine for adults 60 years and older. RSV season closely follows the Flu season. Talk to your doctor if RSV vaccine is recommended for you.

Food Safety Education Facts and Information

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), every year:

- one in six Americans get sick from foodborne illness
- 128,000 are hospitalized
- 3,000 people die

Unsafe food handling practices, poor personal hygiene and contaminated food preparation surfaces or equipment contribute to a large part of foodborne illnesses in the United States. To minimize the risk of foodborne illness, everyone who works with food must:

- learn the different types of food contamination and understand the ways food can become contaminated
- know what potentially hazardous foods, also known as high-risk foods, are and how to handle them properly
- understand the biological causes foodborne illness such as bacteria, toxins and viruses
- follow the proper way to store, thaw, prepare, cook and serve food
- properly and regularly clean and sanitize surfaces, dishes, utensils and equipment
- always practice good personal hygiene

Know the Signs:

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Exhaustion:

- ✓ High body temperature
- High heart rate and low blood pressure,
- ✓ Dehydration and electrolyte loss
- ✓ Extreme weakness
- ✓ Trouble walking.
- ✓ Fainting, or light headedness,
- Abdominal cramps, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea,

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Stroke:

- ✓ High body temperature
- ✓ Profuse sweating
- ✓ Headache
- ✓ Irrational behavior,
- ✓ Emotional instability
- ✓ Altered consciousness.
- Coma, or seizure.

Who is at risk:

Anyone, but those with the following are at a higher risk:

- √ High hody mass index or obesity
- ✓ Old age.
- Poor physical health,
- ✓ Sleep deprived.

Health conditions that predispose you to dehydration and malnutrition.

Rabies Info. From the TCCHD

Beginning July 31, 2023, the US Dept. of Agriculture and Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service Wildlife Services, along with the Ohio Department of Health and several Ohio local health departments, will begin distributing an oral rabies vaccine (ORV) by ground and aircraft to immunize wild raccoons in Trumbull County.

Contingent on good weather, the operation should be completed by August 25, 2023.

It is best to leave baits alone unless found in area where a child or pet might find it.

Wear gloves or use paper towel if you pick up a bait. There is no exposure risk in handling an intact bait. It is recommended that you wash your hands and any exposed skin thoroughly with soap and water after handling any rabies vaccine bait. Ingesting the vaccine will not harm your pet; however, vomiting and diarrhea have occurred in dogs that have ingested multiple baits.

(Quality in Action)

At the TTCHD half day staff training on 6-30-2023, the TCCHD quarterly update occurred for all of our Quality Improvement Endeavors. The following were a few key points taken away from all the data sources:

- According to the Quality Improvement
 Quarterly Efficiency Survey (2nd Quarter
 2023), nearly 80% of TCCHD staff Overall, are
 satisfied with the tools they currently have
 and use to perform their respective daily job
 duties. * This survey was revamped for the 3rd
 quarter however, and the results from such will
 differ in the next newsletter.
- The TCCHD QI Calendar is still being discussed and initially formatted by the administrative core team and will be released relatively soon,
- For 2023, TCCHD staff reports (via QI maturity survey) an aggregate 36% increase in understanding of all things QI being done in the TCCHD when compared to the same survey from 2022,
- The administrative core team is slated to discuss some possible candidates for upcoming quality improvement projects. The following are some potential topics that have been submitted over the past 24 months:

 - QI Monthly Contender and Champion,
 - Successorship/Mentorship participation, (no one has participated yet).

 - And Phone Tree Revamp.



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More Great News for the TCCHD and the Homeless Youth within Trumbull County

The TCCHD in collaboration with the Greater Warren-Youngstown Urban League's (GWYUL) Christy House Emergency Shelter (CHES) has been awarded a Youth Homelessness grant to prevent and end youth homelessness in Trumbull County. The aim of this grant and its subsequent work is to help roughly 50 youths who are experiencing homelessness in Trumbull County annually. This help will include, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, and emergency shelter. In addition to this great news, the grant also aligns with our community health assessment priority of addressing barriers around access to care, and the Community Health Improvement Plan objective of increasing access to care.
